

World Mission Sunday

The National Director writes

'I have a dream...' is the beginning of a famous speech given by the civil rights activist Martin Luther King Jr in 1963. His dream was that all people, from every race, would one day live together in peace and harmony - equal under God - for the good of all. As we look around our divided world. we can see that this dream is still more dream than reality.

Pope Francis has a wonderful way with words. In his recent address to us at Missio. he spoke of 'dreaming with eyes wide open'. That is, looking forward towards a new era of missionary activity when each and every one of us will live out the mission entrusted to us by Jesus Christ.

The Holy Father went on to say that the very heart of our Gospel message is this: 'God loves us with eternal love: he calls us to be his children and to share in the joy that comes from him. He comes to seek us when we are lost; he lifts us up when we fall and raises us from the dead. He turns no one away, but welcomes all, excludes no one, but calls everyone.'

As we approach World Mission Sunday on 22 October, we use this belief to keep the dream alive, for indeed it is God's dream for us. As an example of our mission, we will focus this year on the wonderful work of Sister Mary in Kenya, who is reaching out with her local community to protect vulnerable children from harm.

We face many difficulties and problems. both locally and globally. We are called to hold the dream of God's Kingdom in balance with the reality we find in the world, never losing our joy, our courage, and our hope.

'Thy Kingdom Come' is the prayer to which we commit ourselves daily; mind, body, and soul. It is the dream for which Missio exists.

Where does it take place? World Mission Sunday Masses take place in every single Catholic parish in the world. Through our prayers, we support missionaries everywhere in spreading the Good News. And by donating, we respond to Christ's call to tell everyone the Good News that God loves them.

Why is it important? World Mission Sunday is vital to the growth of the Church and the spread of the Gospel in predominately impoverished and remote areas overseas. It provides the financial assistance needed to help struggling communities survive, and ultimately flourish, through the work of dedicated missionaries.

Who organises it? Missio is responsible for World Mission Sunday through the international network of the Pontifical Mission Societies. Missio is proud to be the Pope's charity for world mission and works with the global Missio family to

bring the Church together in compassion and communion. We provide mission dioceses with the essential support they need to become self-sufficient: local church directly helping local church!

What happens to my donation?

Your donations build much-needed infrastructure, from chapels and schools to orphanages, clinics and dispensaries. Requested by the local community, the support from Missio transforms lives. Setting hearts ablaze in Kenya

'Hearts on fire, feet on the move'

cf. Luke 24:13-35



Kibera is the biggest urban 'slum' in Kenya. In fact, it is the biggest in Africa. Rife with all the problems poverty brings – malnourishment, addiction, abuse – it is easy to see Kibera as a place of despair. But missionary Sister Mary and parishioner Linet meet the challenges of life in Kibera with faith and friendship.

ur charism is "be one with the people", "go where people are", says Sr Mary (below). 'It's from St Paul, but our foundress, Sister Magdalene, also took it from St Charles de Foucauld: to be there with them from the grassroots, discover what is happening, and together learn what to do.'

That is why Sr Mary and her fellow Little Sisters of Jesus choose to live in the heart of Kibera, alongside the people they serve. That way, she can better understand the daily challenges, and reach all who are in need.

Sr Mary knows the problems of Kibera are too great to handle alone. So, she works hard to connect with others to inspire and motivate them to bring God's love to those who need it. She shares:

'It's important to be a bridge. I live here with them. I don't have the material things to offer, but I can listen, I can pray for them, because our work is also prayer. And it's important to be able to connect with people. If I am tired or down-hearted I find strength in the heart of Jesus.'






Among the many people Sr Mary works alongside is Linet (above), who courageously lives out her faith by rescuing and fostering children who are at risk from harm. Linet sometimes faces real danger to rescue the children who have been abandoned, orphaned, or trafficked.

Six years ago, a distraught eleven-year-old – Sharon – sought Linet out for protection as she had been hurt by men trying to take advantage of her.

When Linet attempted to reconcile Sharon with her family, she was saddened to learn that Sharon's mother was not able to engage in raising her child as she was struggling with addiction.

Linet vowed to keep Sharon safe, and sought support from Sr Mary. Linet is determined to help as many children as she can. She earned a qualification in violence recovery, which enables her to intervene appropriately when children are being abused, and to involve the right authorities.

But with three children of her own, and another 12 foster children, Linet struggles.



Linet shares:

'We have so many challenges. I have people here who are looking to me not only for food, but for all basic things. It's a challenge to find all of it. I need clothes. I need to pay for school. It's difficult.'

Thankfully, Linet has people like Sr Mary who support her mission. She says:

'Sister Mary has done so much. Sister is always there for me with support – mental, physical, everything. She has always been there for me.'

For Sr Mary, accompanying people in her community helps them live out and strengthen their faith. She explains:

'My mission is befriending. I began with Christians I met in the church. Slowly I gained their confidence and they welcomed me to their houses. They share their problems. When the stories are painful, even if I have nothing to offer, it's possible to find someone who can help. That makes me create friendships with other people who are able to help.

'I do a lot of listening. People come to our house, or I meet them at our church and we sit down and talk. When I can't help them, because sometimes they are so damaged, I contact doctors or Sisters who work with the hospitals.

'So, it's friendship, but a friendship that means you can't just sit and watch; that something has to be done.

'In Kibera, you will find prostitution, or children initiated in things you would never imagine. And there is poverty, of course. So that's one extreme. But here, maybe more than elsewhere, you also find people who live deep values. The ones who know a neighbour is in trouble and open their doors for one another. They know who they can go to and who can help. If a woman is in labour she will knock on someone's door and say, "Take me to hospital". And they do that.

'So, there is a lot of good; people lift each other. In our church you discover groups, be it the choir, the Rosary group, or the people who meet for adoration. They say, "We need to contribute something for those who cannot". They might not give much, but that little can help a child see the doctor. This one helps that one to return to school. Those values of respecting and supporting each other: you find it more here than elsewhere.'

Linet's faith sees her through the darkest hours, as do the friendships she finds in the church community. She shares:

'My faith means a lot, because when I'm down I still have that faith to keep on. So I need to hold it, to have it with me.

'When I enter the church, my first stop is at the adoration chapel. I'll talk to God. Then I'll go to choir. I see my friends. I just come back feeling good, because I love singing so much. When I sing and praise my God, I'll come home with a clean heart.' We all have a part to play in igniting God's love. This World Mission Sunday, we ask you to join us so that together we can bring God's love to all people, through missionaries like Sr Mary and the inspiring people they walk alongside.

The Holy Father's message

'Hearts on fire, feet on the move'

Dear brothers and sisters!

or this year's World Mission Sunday, I have chosen a theme inspired by the story of the disciples on the way to Emmaus, in the Gospel of Luke (cf. 24:13-35): 'Hearts on fire, feet on the move'.

Those two disciples were confused and dismayed, but their encounter with Christ sparked in them the enthusiastic desire to set out again towards Jerusalem and proclaim that the Lord had truly risen.

In the Gospel account, we perceive this change in the disciples through a few revealing images: their hearts burned within them as they heard the Scriptures explained by Jesus, their eyes were opened as they recognised him and, ultimately, their feet set out on the way. By meditating on these three images, which reflect the journey of all missionary disciples, we can renew our zeal for evangelisation in today's world.

1. Our hearts burned within us 'when he explained the Scriptures to us'. In missionary activity, the word of God illumines and transforms hearts. On the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus, the hearts of the two disciples were downcast... Faced with the failure of the crucified Master, their hopes that he was the Messiah collapsed (cf. v. 21).

Then, 'as they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and walked with them' (v. 15). As when he first called the disciples, so now, amid their bewilderment, the Lord takes the initiative; he approaches them and walks alongside them. So too, in his great mercy, he never tires of being with us, despite all our failings, doubts, weaknesses...

Today, as then, the Risen Lord remains close to his missionary disciples and walks beside them, particularly when they feel disoriented, discouraged, or fearful... For the Lord is greater than all our problems because this mission is his and we are nothing more than his humble co-workers (cf. Luke 17:10).

After listening to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, the risen Jesus, 'beginning with Moses and all the prophets, explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself' (Luke 24:27). They later said: 'Were not our hearts burning within us

while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?' (v. 32). Jesus is himself the living Word, who alone can make our hearts burn within us, as he enlightens and transforms them.

2. Our eyes were 'opened and recognised him' in the breaking of the bread. Jesus in the Eucharist is the source and summit of mission.

The fact that their hearts burned for the Word of God prompted the disciples of Emmaus to ask the mysterious wayfarer to stay with them as evening drew near. Their eyes were opened when he took the bread, blessed it, broke it and gave it to them.

Yet at the very moment when they recognised Jesus in the breaking of the bread, 'he vanished from their sight' (Luke 24:31). Here we recognise an essentia reality of our faith: Christ, who breaks the bread, now becomes the bread broken, shared with the disciples, and consumed by them. He is seen no longer, for now he has entered the hearts of the disciples, to make them burn all the more, and this prompts them to set out immediately to share with everyone their unique experience of meeting the Risen Lord.

Breaking our material bread with the hungry in the name of Christ is already a work of Christian mission. How much more so is the breaking of the Eucharistic bread, which is Christ himself, a work of mission par excellence, since the Eucharist is the source and summit of the life and mission of the Church.

3. Our feet set out on the way, with the joy of telling others about the Risen Christ. The eternal youth of a Church that is always going forth.

The image of 'feet setting out' reminds us once more of the mission entrusted to the Church by the risen Lord: to evangelise all individuals and peoples, even to the ends of the earth. Today more than ever, our human family, wounded by so many situations of injustice, so many divisions and wars, is in need of the Good News of peace and salvation in Christ.

I take this opportunity to reiterate that 'everyone has the right to receive the Gospel' and that Christians have the duty to proclaim it without excluding anyone.

All of us can contribute to this mission: with our prayers and activities, with material offerings and the offering of our sufferings, and with our personal witness. Missio is the privileged means of fostering this missionary cooperation on both the spiritual and material levels. For this reason, the collection taken on World Mission Sunday is devoted to Missio's Association for the Propagation of the Faith.

Closer missionary cooperation on the part of all her members and at every level is an essential goal of the synodal journey that the Church has undertaken.

So let us set out once more, to make other hearts burn with the word of God, to open the eyes of others to Jesus in the Eucharist, and to invite everyone to walk together on the path of peace and salvation that God, in Christ, has bestowed upon all humanity.

Sharing hope in Ethiopia

'You shall be my witnesses... to the ends of the earth' Acts 1:8



For World Mission Sunday in 2022, we featured the work of Spanish lay missionary Maria in Meki, Ethiopia.

As Director of the Kidist Mariam
Centre, Maria and her amazing local team continue to work hard to provide a safe, supportive, and educational environment for vulnerable women, so they no longer have to leave their families and communities to find work.

our generosity and prayers on World Mission Sunday in 2022 meant that people like Maria were able to keep loving, serving and sharing God's hope with others: 'It doesn't matter where we come from, where we live, where we are working... we are God's dream, and we have to fulfil that dream... So, we have to do our best not only to live out our dream, but also to make real the dreams of so many other people and so many other young women.'





With your support, the Kidist Mariam Centre has continued to provide vocational training, including food preparation, hairdressing, and tailoring.

According to Maria's latest report: 'Conflict and political instability in Ethiopia, the continuing effects of the pandemic, and climate change affecting much of the country are making it increasingly difficult for vulnerable families to have the bare minimum necessary to live. Shortages of food and basic goods in local markets further worsen the situation.

'In September 2022, new students were registered at the Kidist Mariam Centre. The total number of students in May 2023 are 380: 180 students in hairdressing, 163 students in tailoring, 37 in food preparation.'



You may remember Beth* (above), who featured in our World Mission Sunday 2022 campaign. Unable to find employment locally, she had travelled overseas and became a domestic worker to help support her family living in Meki. Sadly, her employer abused and exploited her.

Throughout her darkest moments, Beth's faith was a beacon. She explained: 'I believe that God is always before you and behind you in all your troubles... He is prominent for a person like me, who has fallen in life. He is my life. God is my life and my everything.'



We are delighted to share that Beth graduated recently and wanted to tell you that 'Missio helped to make it possible...
May God make you prosper, may you be measured by the measure you have given...
Thank you. God bless you.'

Maria wrote: 'It is a great joy for us to express once again our most sincere gratitude for the help received from Missio in England and Wales.

'When, despite all the difficulties that surround us, we witness how the women with whom we have worked in this project have been able to get out of poverty and have their own profession, we can only thank God for His mercy and for allowing us to be instruments of His goodness towards the neediest.

'This project has contributed enormously to the empowerment of young women, both economically and personally. They have formed a community with many others in similar situations.'

DID YOU KNOW? In much of the developing world, many public services, such as hospitals and schools, are run by the Catholic Church. Missio is the only Catholic charity which supports all of the 40% of the Universal Church currently in need of support from the rest of the Church.

Fr Michael Corcoran MHM, General Superior of St Joseph's Missionary Society, reports on the latest news from the Mill Hill Missionaries:

he need continues for missionary disciples to be ready to set out and to be open to exploring new paths, as they seek to share the Gospel through word and deed. Pope Francis refers to this as 'evangelical zeal' and we are all called to 'rekindle the charism of God that is within you' (2 Timothy 1:6).

The founder of the Mill Hill Missionaries saw this as our charism: 'to go where the need is greatest'.

Mill Hill Missionaries have been present for well over a century in Malaysia. But in the seventies, our missionaries were expelled from the state of Sabah because of the political situation at the time. The local government wanted the Christian missionaries out.

Despite this, the most important thing was that the foundations were built, and they were solid. The lay people and the people who had been trained or empowered were able to keep faith alive as they built up their own local Church.

One of the fruits of that experience is that the first Malaysian Mill Hill Missionary was ordained four years ago and appointed to Cambodia.

The second Malaysian Mill Hill Missionary – Elvost – has been ordained recently and





will be appointed to the Sindh province in Pakistan. He was there as a student for the Missionary Experience Programme, and he can't wait to go back. Isn't that wonderful!

We are sending a missionary from a historically persecuted Church in Malaysia to minister in another persecuted Church currently in Pakistan. Elvost (above) will be able to relate to the situation very well and he has so much to offer that local Church from his experience.

Elvost received formation in Nairobi,
Kenya. He was deliberately sent there so
he could live alongside students from
other countries – Cameroon, Uganda,
Kenya, India, and the Philippines. The Mill
Hill Missionary formation is not just
academic; there's much more to it. It's
teaching how to live together as Christians
and as human beings. And when Elvost goes
to Sindh in Pakistan, he will be working with
Kenyans, Filipinos, an English and an Irish
Priest, alongside the local community.

There's a third Malaysian Mill Hill Missionary who is currently in formation. He will take his time and once he's ready he will be 'sent out'. Our whole Mill Hill Missionary focus is 'crossing boundaries' – crossing boundaries into a different country; the culture, the language, even the food!

In the world we live in today, I believe we are called to be signs of mercy, of forgiveness, of listening and of attentiveness to each other and to those we serve. We see a world around us fractured by disagreement, extremes on every side, an inability to listen, a quickness to categorise and a refusal to even encounter those who think differently. All of us, most especially those commissioned to go out as missionaries are called to be brothers and sisters to all, to open a dialogue of presence, of respect, of dignity... and so we live as witnesses.

I am very much aware of the generous response of all those supporting our missionary endeavours especially through our partnership with Missio. I give thanks to God and to all of you, God's people.

Children are missionaries, too!






ission Together is the children's branch of Missio. Here in England and Wales it has an important task: to help children realise that they are each called to share God's great love with other children throughout the world.


